# GENERAL INFORMATION

# PART-TIME STUDENTS

Part-time students having a Cumulative Grade Point Average of 2.0 may register for one or two courses per semester. They must obtain the consent of the Academic Dean and the instructor, and have adequate preparation for the course(s).

## AUDITORS

With the consent of the instructor, students may audit classes (graduate seminars excepted). The procedure for registering and the fee is the same as that required of other students.

# CHANGE OF PROGRAM

Any change in registration must be made on the "Change of Registration" form, and be signed by the student's adviser. Forms are available in the Registrar's Office. A fee of \$1.00 is charged for each change after the first week of classes.

Students who wish to discontinue classes must file a "Notice of Withdrawal" form. This form is available in the Registrar's Office. Honorable dismissal will be granted when the form is filed. Students who plan to change status must also file the proper form.

# COLLEGE EXPENSES

Full payment of all expenses, with the exception of special fees, is due on or before registration day of each semester.
