The normal course load for Summer Session students is 3-6 units. A student is required to have written permission of their respective department chair for more than 6 units.

#### REGISTRATION

Students are strongly encouraged to register by mail prior to JUNE 8. Once registration has been filed, class changes require an Add/Drop form. **WITHDRAWAL** 

To withdraw completely from Summer Session or to withdraw from an individual class, a student must file a withdrawal slip with the Registrar's Office. For classes which extend the entire Summer Session the last day to withdraw from an individual class is July 20. (See Reduction of Tuition Schedule.)

#### CANCELLATION

The college retains the right to cancel any workshop or class for which there is insufficient enrollment. Courses are subject to cancellation after June 8. Courses require 10 students in order to be held.

#### THE DOHENY CAMPUS OF MOUNT ST. MARY'S COLLEGE

Mount St. Mary's College expanded to a second campus in 1962. The Doheny Campus at Chester Place (Adams and Figueroa) near the intersection of the Harbor and Santa Monica Freeways, is located on property formerly owned by Edward L. Doheny and his wife, the Countess Estelle Doheny. The campus has been named for them.

The two city blocks of Victorian residences in their setting of exotic trees and flowers have been converted to educational purposes. In 1965 a classroom building containing an auditorium, lecture rooms, and laboratories was erected. Since that date, Ahmanson Commons, containing the food service and seminar facilities, and McIntyre Hall, a student residence and activity center, have been added to the campus.

The Doheny Campus supplements and extends the educational opportunities which Mount St. Mary's College offers. This location, close to the business center of Los Angeles, was thought to be ideal for two-year, career-oriented associate degree programs, and for California teaching credential programs.

#### LOCATION OF CLASSROOMS

Bldg. 4, Bldg. 11, and Hope Center (HC) are located on the Doheny Campus. Humanities Bldg. (H) is located on the Chalon Campus.

Over half of all Native American Indians live in or near the city in the United States. Ministry in a Native American Indian context engages traditional values, lifestyle and wisdom from many tribal cultures in urban life. This course will explore how to bridge culture and faith, pastoral models and training, and the wider implications of inculturation, spirituality and social justice in an American context. The course will explore the contributions of contemporary Christian Native American Indians to the renewal of Native American Indian life and cultural survival.

This course aims at helping the student understand from a psychological perspective, how religion functions in p the human personality. It covers both healthy and unhealthy forms of religion. It will draw on the theories of specific religious psychologists such as William James and on personality theorists such as Jung, Fromm, Erickson, and Gilligan.

#### THE AMERICAN EXPERIENCE What is it?

THE AMERICAN EXPERIENCE is a 3 week multi-cultural experience offered on the Doheny Campus. This program will integrate the philosophical, religious and cultural aspects of American society. All courses will emphasize the multi-cultural reality of our society.

Those working toward teaching credentials and those in need of in-service units may find all or some of these courses valuable. Students also may enroll in **THE AMERICAN EXPERIENCE** for enrichment (reduced fee/not recorded on transcript).

Courses offered during *THE AMERICAN EXPERIENCE* are undergraduate and credit may be applied toward a Bachelors Degree with a major in American Studies. Students may enroll in any or all of the courses offered.

### COURSE OFFERINGS

#### PHILOSOPHY OF RELIGION AND NATIVE CULTURES - a 3 unit

course offered daily except (Wednesday) by Wanda Teays; July 6-24 from 9:00am. until noon. PHI 160 - Index # 495110

In this course, we will examine issues and themes in Native American philosophy, relilgion, and mythology. This course is not intended to be a focused study of any one Native culture or religion, but an overview of concerns. We will survey various tribes from the Southwest, Mexico (Huichol), Northwest (Kwakiutl, Haida, Tlingit), and Far North (Inuit). Along with our overview, students may choose to work on a special topic (e.g recovering ancestor's bones from museums, reclaiming sacred space, the use of peyte in religious rituals, treaty disputes, environmental issues. A special workshop will be arranged for those interested in teaching techniques and applications to the classroom. [GS: VA4 & VB1 - Prerequisites: one philosophy and one religious studies course]

**RELIGION AND AMERICAN EXPERIENCE** - a 3 unit course offered daily except (Wednesday) by Gail Gresser and Sr. Kathleen Mary McCarthy; July 6-24 from 5:00 until 8:00pm. AMS 150 - Index # 494105

What are the ways we have thought about religion and the idea of America? How have religious ideas and institutions affected the social and political culture in this country? This course will attempt to answer these questions through an examination of the

contemporary society, but drawing from historical precedent. Topics will include the influence of religious ideas on the debate and documents of the founding of this nation, the role of religion in social movements, the separation of Church and State, and the contribution of religious ideas to contemporary issues.

Three one unit courses will be offered for one week each from 1:00 until 4:00 pm.

#### July 13-17 CRITICAL THINKING AND MULTI-CULTURAL EDUCATION by Dr. Wanda Teays

Critical Thinking is not a tool for preserving the status quo, but is a means for grasping the bigger picture. The bigger picture is multi-cultural. In this course, we will look at the different theoretical models of Multi-Cultural Education, along with expressions of identity, social issues and themes and ways to address bias, prejudice, and oppression. Attention will be given to methods and materials to enhance Critical Thinking in the classroom. A special workshop will be arranged to focus more in-depth on teaching applications.
