Changes in Academic Policy

The following entries represent changes in academic policies effective Fall of 1995. These items are not found in the 1994-1996 General Catalog. Unless noted, all academic policies are the same as published on pages 40-48 in the 1994-1996 General Catalog

AUDIT

Effective Fall 1995 the grading selection of Audit should be selected when a student wishes to **preview** a course which will be enrolled in at a later date for a letter grade OR to **review** a course that has already been successfully completed as preparation for further study, OR for intellectual curiosity and enrichment.

Procedure:

- Students must register for an **Audit** by the end of the second week of the semester on space-available basis.
- Once requested the **Audit** status cannot be reversed.
- Students must attend a reasonable number of classes in order to receive an “**AU**” on their transcript.
- Faculty have the option of requesting other requirements in addition to reasonable attendance such as participation of the students requesting to audit. A space will be provided on the Audit Request Form where faculty can stipulate the conditions agreed upon for the **Audit**.
- If the conditions of the **Audit** are not met the instructor may use the grading option of “**U**” (Unauthorized Withdrawal).

CR/NC

Beginning with the Fall 1995 semester the following changes in the Credit/No-Credit policy will become effective:

- A. Courses used to fulfill General Studies requirements **may not** be taken CR/NC.
- B. Students **may not** take more than six (6) units of elective units on a CR/NC basis. Courses which are only offered on a CR/NC basis are not counted as part of the six units.
- C. The deadline for changing the grading in a course to CR/NC will be the tenth (10) week of the semester. Consult the academic calendar and the Registrar's office for the specific date.

INCOMPLETE

Beginning with the Fall 1995 semester the college's policy on **incomplete** is amended to include the following changes:

- A. A student requesting an incomplete must obtain the signature and consent of the instructor and the department chairperson by the last day of class and prior to the day of the final exam.
- B. Faculty must assign a **default** grade when approving an incomplete. This default grade will be recorded on the student's transcript history when a completed grade is not assigned by the instructor and/or an extension of the incomplete is not processed.
- C. An **incomplete** may only be extended for one additional semester with the approval of the instructor, the department chairperson, and the appropriate academic dean.

Withdrawal

*The following changes in the college's withdrawal policy were implemented as of the **Fall of 1994** and were not published in the corresponding catalog.*

- A. The deadline for withdrawing from a class with a grade of "W" is the tenth week of the semester. In cases where a class is offered on a split-semester basis, the deadline for withdrawing will be one week after the midpoint of the course. Consult the academic calendar and the Registrar's office for the specific date.

- B. After the tenth week deadline for withdrawal, a student may be allowed to withdraw from all of her/his classes because of an emergency or extraordinary circumstance by submitting an Academic Petition to the appropriate Academic Dean.

DEANS LIST

A change in the Dean's List Policy has been implemented to include the Weekend College. In order to qualify for the Deans List Weekend College students must have completed at least 9 letter-graded units in the preceding semester.

PROGRAM & DEPARTMENT **UPDATES**

The following entries represent changes in academic programs or departments effective Fall of 1995. These items are not found in the 1994-1996 General Catalog. When possible 1994-1996 General Catalog page references are made by using parentheses.

Education

A minimum GPA of 3.0 in upper division work is required for admission in the Master of Science in Education program. (p.74)

Education classes require field observation; therefore, transportation for these classes is essential. (p.124)

Courses must have been taken for a letter grade. Narrative assessment will be considered. Pass/Fail or Credit/No Credit courses are not accepted for course equivalency. (p.125)

All education courses are to be taken on a letter grade basis, except EDU 100, 101, 102, and supervised teaching, which are CR/NC courses. (p.127)

Gerontology

To declare a minor in Gerontology a student must take at least 5 approved courses from Mount St. Mary's College.(p.151)

History

HIS 142 Europe: Politics and Theology in the Age of Reformation fulfills General Studies requirement GS-VA4 and GS-IIIC.

To declare a minor in History a student must take at least 5 approved courses from Mount St. Mary's College.(p.152)

Journalism

JRN 1 will now be **JRN 101**

JRN 2 will now be **JRN 102**

Both course descriptions remain the same. The two courses have been changed from lower division to upper division credit.

Lifetime Fitness and Recreation

The Physical Education department has changed its name to "Lifetime Fitness and Recreation".

Modern Languages

Please note that in order for a student to acquire a B.A. with a major in either French or Spanish, a minimum of 9 units of the required 24 upper division units must be taken at MSMC.

Also note that for a student to acquire a Minor in either French or Spanish, a minimum of 6 units of French or Spanish must be completed at MSMC.

Any course completed with a grade of "D" or below is not acceptable toward a Major or Minor in either French or Spanish and must be repeated.

The prerequisite for **FRE 199A/B** has been changed to require the completion of **FRE 25** plus one upper division course in French. Please contact the Chairperson of the Department for further information.

The prerequisite for **SPA 199A/B** has been changed to require the completion of **SPA 25** plus one upper division course in Spanish. Please contact the Chairperson of the Department for further information.

Associate Degree Majors in Nursing

The following are changes or additions to the ADN Program. Unless noted, all other requirements are the same as published in the 1994-1996 catalog (see pages 182-185).

Admission

Effective Fall of 1995 admission requirements have been changed to require **two** recommendations and a cumulative GPA of 2.500.

Curriculum Requirements:

Second Year

PHI 21 has been changed to **PHI 10 Critical Thinking**.

PSY 49 has been changed to **HSP 49 Multicultural and Multiethnic Issues for Urban Health Care Professionals**.

NUR 34 has been added to the second year curriculum.

Third Year

RST 149 has been changed to the lower division equivalent **RST 49 Ethics of Life and Death**.

Baccalaureate Majors in Nursing

Admission

To be admitted to the Nursing department an applicant must first be admitted to the college and then fulfill the Nursing admission requirements. Admission to the Sophomore level nursing courses is considered for the Fall semester only, and is based on cumulative GPA, science GPA, essay, and letters of reference. Personal interviews **may** be scheduled for qualified applicants once admission documents are received.

Effective Fall 1996:

Failure ("C-" and below) of two required Nursing courses (ie. Nutrition, Anatomy, Microbiology) results in non-admission or dismissal from the Nursing program.

A science GPA of 2.500 is required for admission to the program. The science GPA will consist of the grades from Chemistry, Anatomy, Physiology, and Microbiology.

Nursing Department Policies

Credit for NUR 51/61 and 53L/63L is contingent upon passing NUR 50 and NUR 54 in the Fall semester and upon passing NUR 60 and NUR 64 in the Spring semester.

All students who receive a grade of "C-" or below in a Nursing theory course will receive a no-credit grade in the concurrent clinical course and skills laboratory.

Degree Requirements

A Bachelor of Science with a major in Nursing requires a total of 130.5 units. Significant changes will be made in the Nursing curriculum beginning Fall of 1996 and will be represented in the upcoming 1996-1998 General Catalog. However, Freshmen entering the college in the **Fall of 1995** are admitted into the new curriculum as printed in this Catalog Supplement.

Occupational Therapy Assistant Program

The GPA admission requirement has been updated to a minimum of 2.25. The AA general studies requirements and OTA required courses have to be completed before students are eligible to sit for the national certification exam qualifying them for practice as Certified Occupational Therapy Assistants.

Political Science

Pre-Health Science Program (Associate Degree)

The **Pre-Health Science Program** is designed for students who wish to pursue studies which prepare them for a health related profession. The Pre-Health Science Program provides the student with the opportunity to take the general studies-requirements and preparatory courses for programs in Nursing, Physical Therapy, Optometry, Medical Technology, or Pre-Med. It also gives the student the opportunity to consider career alternatives. Acceptance into the Health Science Programs is dependent on attaining the required GPA and fulfilling the specific requirements of each program. Students completing the Pre-Health Science requirements receive an Associate in Arts degree.

New Programs or Departments **Effective 1995-1996**

The following are programs or departments that are new and are being implemented for the first time in the academic year of 1995-1996. They have not been listed in a previous Mount St. Mary's College catalog.

Accelerated Baccalaureate Nursing Program

The Accelerated Baccalaureate Nursing (AccBSN) Program is the same curriculum design as the Baccalaureate Nursing Program (BSN), follows the stated philosophy, and students meet the terminal objectives as delineated for the Baccalaureate program.

The AccBSN program offers the BSN program within a one year (May to May) time frame and is a vigorous program of study. The Accelerated student completes a three semester course of study, beginning with the first Summer session, followed by a Fall semester, and ending with a final Spring semester. At the completion of the final semester, graduates are eligible to take the licensure examination and to qualify for the California Public Health Nursing Certificate. The AccBSN program is approved by the California Board of Registered Nursing.

AccBSN Application Procedure

AccBSN applicants must submit the following documents:

- 1.) Completed admissions application
 - 2.) Personal statement of intent
 - 3.) Official transcripts of all college work
 - 4.) Two recommendations by those acquainted in the applicants ability to succeed in an accelerated curriculum.
- Personal interviews are scheduled for qualified applicants.

AccBSN Program Admission Requirements

The AccBSN program is open to persons who have previously completed a baccalaureate degree and who meet specific admission requirements. Admission to the program is open only once a year, with decisions mailed in February.

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To be considered for admission, students must be graduates of an accredited four year college or university with an earned grade point average of at least 2.800.

A minimum grade of "C" (2.00) must have been earned in the following core requirements as well as fulfilling the outlined general studies requirements.

Entrance Requirements

Before entrance, admitted students must:

- 1.) Complete the Nursing Dept. Math Test with a minimum score of 85%.
- 2.) Complete the necessary health forms and immunizations.
- 3.) Be current in CPR.
- 4.) Carry malpractice insurance.

Costs/Financial Aid/Registration

Tuition for the AccBSN program is the same as the standard Mount St. Mary's College undergraduate tuition and fees. Please refer to the Fees and Expenses for exact figures and guidelines.

New Programs and Departments

While AccBSN students are not eligible for Mount St. Mary's grants or scholarships, students may be eligible for federal, state, or private grants or loans. In order to qualify, students must send the FAFSA forms to the processor no later than January 15. Information on financial aid eligibility will be sent prior to the deposit deadline. A deposit fee of \$300.00 is due on March 20.

The registration deadline is April 21, 1995.

Women's Studies

Interdepartmental

The Women's Studies Minor augments the advantages women have in attending a women's college. Sensitivity and attention to the diversity of women's perspective and women's issues are part of numerous courses offered at Mount St. Mary's College. The courses which qualify for the Women's Studies Minor elevate the attention to women's perspectives to the center of the courses content. A minor in Women's Studies gives students the background and skills necessary to deal with issues of gender that they will face in their personal and work lives.

Courses Required for a Minor in Women's Studies

The Minor in Women's Studies requires 18 units of coursework from at least 3 academic disciplines. Students must complete a minimum of 12 units from upper division courses. The courses which qualify for the minor are designated "WS" in the schedule of classes.

New Programs and Departments

There is only one required course for the Women's Studies Minor: **WST 100 Women, Culture and Society**. While it is recommended that WST 100 be taken as the first women's studies course, other "WS" courses may precede it.

The Women's Studies Minor is inter-disciplinary and therefore has all of its courses, other than WST 100, cross listed under other academic departments. Many of the "WST" designated courses are general studies courses. Students may have a maximum of 6 units transfer from other institutions for credit toward the Women's Studies Minor with verification and approval by the Women's Studies Coordinator. Students may also use up to 6 units of independent study toward the Women's Studies Minor with approval in advance.

Students interested in the Women's Studies Minor should contact the Women's Studies Coordinator to discuss course options.

The Following are New Courses Implemented Academic Year 1995-1996.

BIO 67/167 Environmental Science (3)

An introduction to the multidisciplinary field of environmental science. Topics include human population dynamics, ecosystem structure and function, laws of matter and interactions, biodiversity, wildlife and habitat conservation, renewable a non-renewable resources, types of pollution and effects of pollutants on human health. Emphasis is placed on the interrelationship of population growth, resource use and pollution. **GS-IIID**

ENG 10AB Written Communication (3,3)

A two-term course in principles and practice of writing standard English. Includes informal and formal expository writing; analytical and critical writing and reading; research processes; library skills. Fulfills associate and bachelor's degree Communication Skills requirement in writing. *Prerequisite: grade of "C" or better in ENG 3X or a satisfactory grade on the English placement test.*
GS-1A

INT 96 Culture, Race and Communication (1)

Study and interaction focused on culture and intercultural conflicts. Topics introduced include race and racism, stereotyping and prejudice, and understanding privilege. Emphasis on communication skills.

NUR 30 Pharmacology (2)

This comprehensive course involves an adaptation process approach to drug classifications and specific pharmacological interventions as they relate to alterations in physiological and psychosocial mode function.

NUR 41 Adaptation Nursing Theory (3)

Introduces the Roy Adaptation Model of Nursing with emphasis on the physiological and psychosocial modes as related to adult and older adult behaviors. Introduces concepts of cultural diversity, aging, and sexuality.

NUR 42A Fundamentals of Nursing: Theory (2)

Covers basic nursing measures necessary for safe patient care. The focus is to provide the theoretical foundation for selected nursing skills.

- NUR 144 Advanced Med/Surg Nursing (2.5)**
Lecture. The focus of the bio-psycho-social impact of health and illness problems related to complex episodic medical and surgical disruptions in the adult. Patient care management is included.
- NUR 145 Practicum: Adv. Med/Surg Nursing (1.5)**
Clinical practice in the health-illness problems encountered in the care of complex episodic medical and surgical disruptions in the adult. Patient care management is included.
- NUR 146 Adaptation Nursing: Mental Health (2.5)**
Lecture. The focus of the bio-psycho-social impact of health and illness problems related to the mental health of individuals and groups.
- NUR 147 Practicum: Mental Health (1.5)**
Clinical practice in the application of the principles and concepts related to psycho-social problems in psychiatric settings.
- NUR 150 Adaptation Nursing: (1.5)**
Community Health Nursing I
Lecture. Presents research, theories and concepts as applied to aggregated in the community. These include environmental health, basic concepts of epidemiology, communicable disease, preventative health and wellness. The theory and management of these issues and others are discussed and related to a variety of community resources.
- NUR 151 Practicum: (1.5)**
Community Health Nursing I
Clinical practice of the principles of Public Health Nursing in an official agency. An epidemiological approach is implemented to identify and assess problems in high risk aggregates in the community. Community assessment and exploration of community resources are an integral part.
- NUR 152 Adaptation Nursing: (1.5)**
Leadership and Management
Lecture. Principles of leadership and management will be explained as they apply to various nursing (health) delivery systems. Topics include leadership styles, management functions, motivation, group organization, budget and staffing.

- SOC 197 Applied Sociology (3)**
 An opportunity to apply the principles of sociology to an area of special student interest. Directed study under the auspices of community agencies.
 Prerequisites: GPA of 3.00 or better; SOC 005 *Sociological Perspectives*, SOC 117 *Research Methods*, and one other upper division sociology course.
 Permission of the Departmental Chair is required.
- SPA 115 Applied Linguistics (3)**
 Basics of modern descriptive linguistics with emphasis on phonology, morphology and syntax. Applications are drawn to the linguistic approach to the teaching of Spanish.
- SPA 145 The Culture of Emphasis: Spanish Speaking People (3)**
 Special emphasis on the ideas of today's mass media, the customs, political issues, literature, arts, popular culture, geography and history of the Spanish-speaking people of the twentieth century.
- SPA 146 Films and Hispanic Literatures (3)**
 Analysis of main aesthetic, cultural and philosophical questions in the Hispanic world as articulated in literature and films.
- SPA 147 Spanish for Business (3)**
 An introduction to the forms, styles, usages and procedures followed in commercial correspondence and business practices in the Spanish speaking world.
- WST 100 Women, Culture and Society (3)**
 This introductory course to Women's Studies will provide an overview of the women's movement and feminist theory with special attention to the impact of culture and society in forming modern Western ideas of gender. The primary purpose of this course is to illuminate the history and social forces involved in women's status while maintaining a vision for the empowerment of class participants as they prepare to take leadership roles in the global community. Readings and course discussions will focus upon history and sociology to provide a context for understanding gender relations. Students will apply critical thinking techniques to make connections between their experience, or their knowledge of women's experience, and theories concerning gender. **GS-III, IV**

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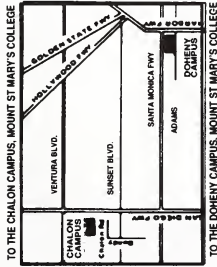
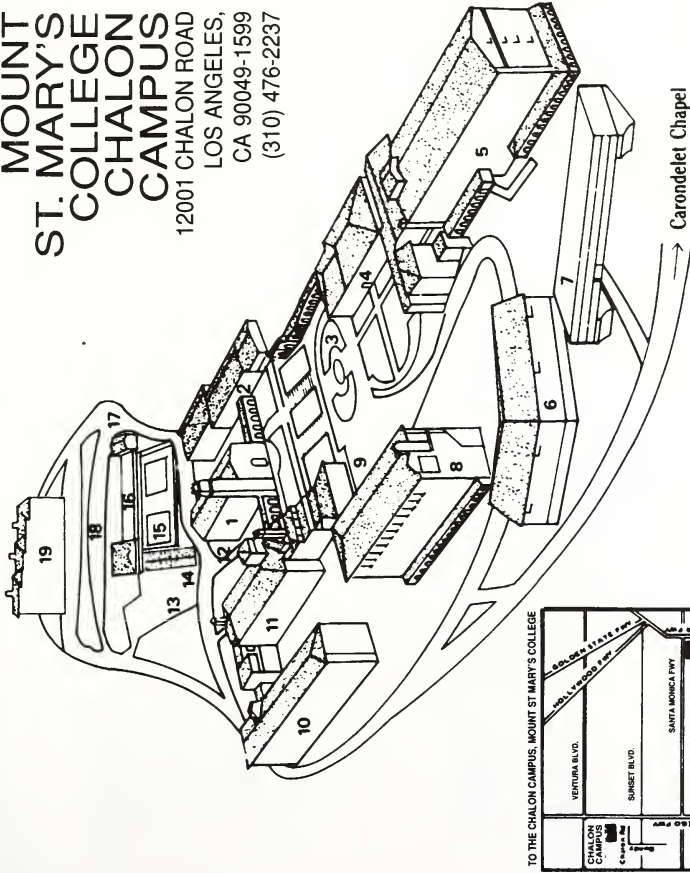
